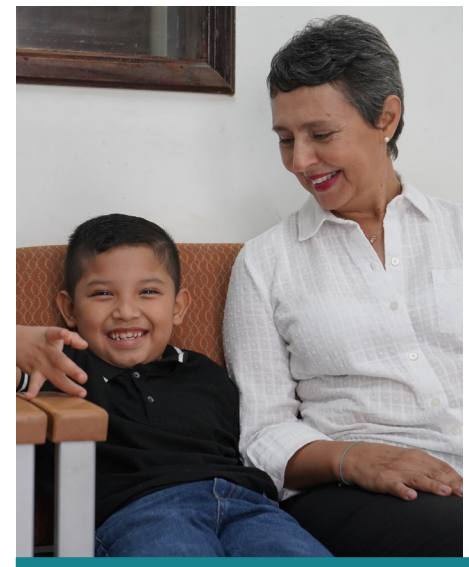

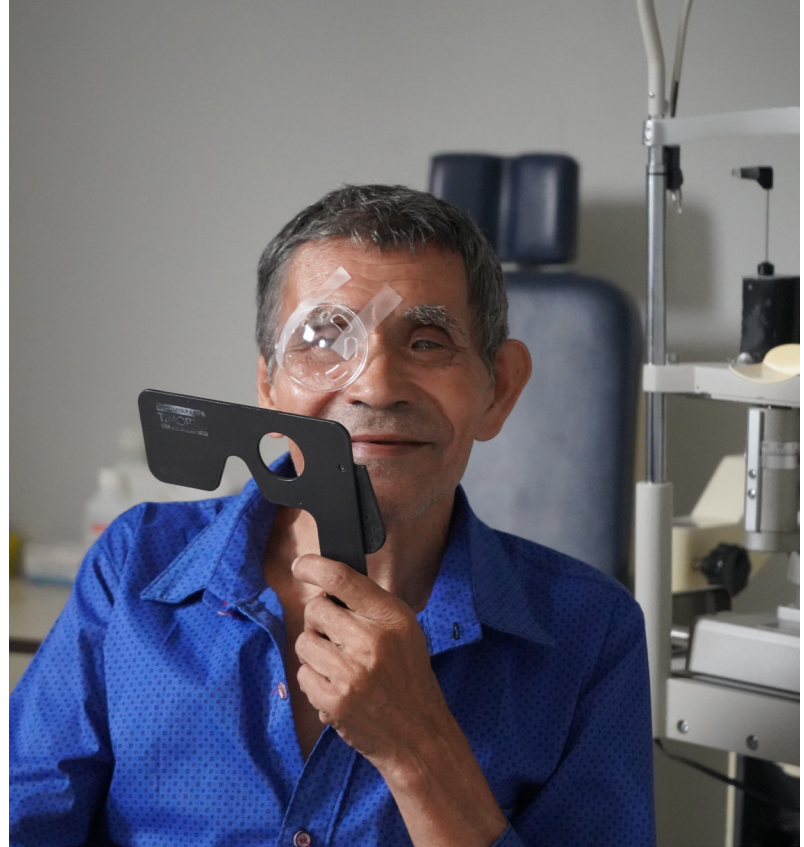

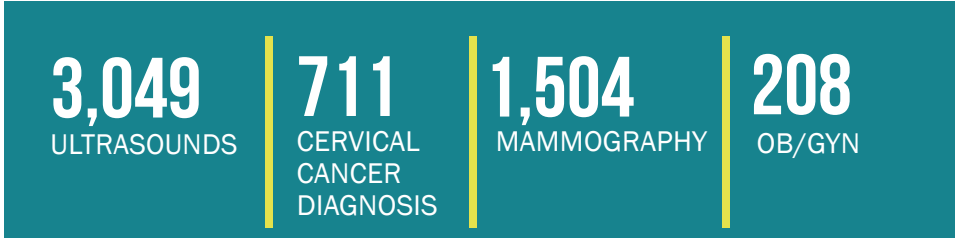
MEDICAL SERVICES

In this fiscal year, CAMO delivered 216,884 medical services in Honduras through medical programs. A new Pediatric Gastroenterology service was introduced, led by volunteer Dr. Gabriela Duarte, helping children access vital care previously unavailable due to high costs. The Nutrition Program expanded significantly, tripling its reach to provide 6,334 evaluations and treatments through 39 brigades. Additionally, CAMO enhanced services across various specialties, including dentistry and neurosurgery. Medical brigades played a key role, with 196 brigades providing 11,510 services to underserved communities.



WOMEN'S HEALTH PROGRAMS

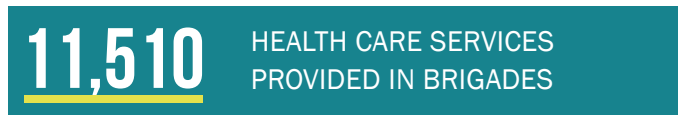
Services Provided:



This fiscal year, CAMO made tremendous strides in women's health, expanding vital services to reach more women in need. With 22 mammography brigades and one cytology brigade, CAMO brought essential breast cancer screenings to underserved communities. The installation of two mammography machines in public health centers enabled 1,504 women to receive potentially life-saving screenings, sparking increased breast cancer awareness and inspiring local organizations to encourage regular check-ups.

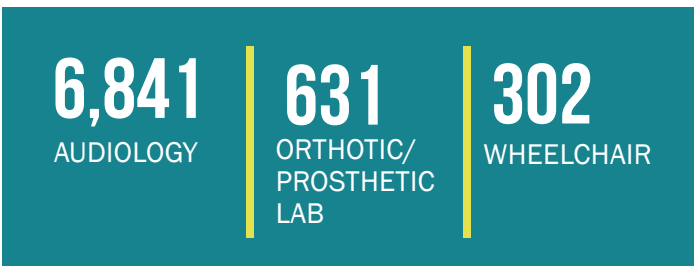
During Cervical Cancer Prevention Week, INSSA generously donated cytology screenings, and CAMO played a pivotal role in raising awareness by hosting educational campaigns focused on cancer prevention. Beyond screenings, CAMO provided specialized treatments for cancerous lesions, including colposcopy, cryotherapy, and LEEP, as well as offering gynecological ultrasounds. CAMO's dedication to women's health extended further through its pathology program, which conducted an impressive 35,301 procedures, such as cytology and biopsies. Through these efforts, CAMO continues to bring hope, care, and healing to women and their families.

SERVICES FOR DISABILITIES

Services Provided:



This year, CAMO's disability services made a difference by providing 7,774 treatments, helping patients lead more independent lives and enhancing their overall quality of life. In partnership with the FAKS Foundation, CAMO's Prosthetics and Orthotics Laboratory brought hope to nine children by donating prostheses and orthoses, with plans to extend this vital support to even more children in the future. As a strategic partner of Honduran Department of Social Development, CAMO assisted many in securing disability cards, ensuring access to

essential rights and services. In another significant milestone, CAMO introduced speech therapy through its Audiometry Program, offering new opportunities for individuals with hearing and speech impairments to improve their communication skills, fostering inclusion and brighter futures for all.



MEDICAL SERVICES

To enhance access to quality medical services, CAMO conducted 196 brigades—90 dental, 8 combined medical and dental, and 32 evaluation brigades—providing 11,510 services in various specialties, mainly in rural communities lacking specialized care. This year, CAMO secured 13 collaboration agreements with municipalities, NGOs, and private companies to expand services. The Dental Program treated 6,327 individuals through clinic and mobile brigades, and partnered with Colgate to certify staff in Oral Health, delivering educational talks and dental kits to children in rural schools. Additionally, the Nutrition Program, in partnership with Harvest Call, distributed 3,436 food buckets to 133 families facing food insecurity. CAMO continues to expand healthcare services with the help of volunteer doctors and donated medical supplies.

CAMO's three surgical programs saw remarkable growth this year, thanks to new volunteer doctors, equipment acquisitions, and strategic partnerships. In Gastroenterology, the team's capacity doubled with the arrival of pediatric gastroenterologist Dr. Gabriela Duarte and the addition of two endoscopes, allowing them to reach more patients than ever before. Neurosurgery made significant advancements with the introduction of a neuronavigation system, enabling precise head and spine surgeries for five patients. This breakthrough technology, combined with the expertise of Dr. JC Tabet and Dr. Roberto Álvarez, has positioned CAMO's Neurosurgery Program as a national leader in the field. In Ophthalmology, a partnership with the Robles Eye Center provided an incredible 4,093 services and 754 surgeries, including 108 cataract surgeries that reduced the existing backlog by 60%. CAMO also facilitated oculoplastic surgeries in collaboration with U.S. counterparts. The Robles Eye Center has become a hub for ophthalmology education in Honduras, welcoming the first three residents this year and serving as a training center for the ophthalmology residency program. Through these efforts, CAMO continues to deliver life-changing care and brighter futures for those in need.



MAINTENANCE

Services Provided:

1,211 MEDICAL EQUIPMENT BIOMEDICAL
LAB AND FACILITY



Before CAMO established the Biomedical and Maintenance Center at Hospital de Occidente, unreliable medical equipment repairs led to financial losses and compromised patient care. The introduced standardized procedures, enhancing hospital efficiency and service capacity. This year, the biomedical team serviced 238 pieces of equipment and managed 1,211 maintenance orders, including corrective and preventive maintenance, ensur-

ing safe and efficient patient care across all CAMO's programs and medical brigades.





EDUCATION IS KEY



EDUCATION AND TRAINING

CAMO's educational services focus on several key areas:

Medical Training: Offering American Heart Association certification courses, nursing protocols, and continuing education.

Primary Education: Supporting supplies, textbook and teacher workshops in 16 rural schools.

University Collaboration: Assisting in the curriculum development for the Respiratory Therapy career path in Honduras.

CAMO continues to serve as the main training center for the American Heart Association in Honduras, with 12 certified CPR instructors and 5 trained in Nursing Protocols. Over the past year, 103 courses were delivered in CPR and Nursing Protocols.

Additionally, CAMO received a USAID grant for the "Creating My Future Here" project, training 543 young people in first aid, CPR, and nursing protocols. The initiative also included training 836 individuals in soft skills, resulting in 443 successful job placements.



EDUCATION AND TRAINING

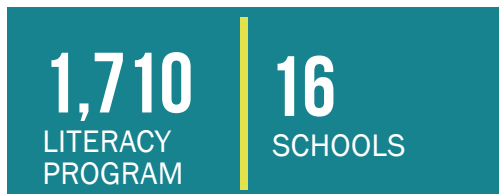
UNIVERSITY COLLABORATION:



This year, CAMO made significant strides in establishing the Respiratory Therapy (RT) career in Honduras, a need emphasized by the pandemic. For the past decade, CAMO has collaborated with Honduran universities and the Ministry of Health to promote this initiative. Working with both private and public universities, they developed a common curriculum for the RT career path. Future key medical professors gained practical experience during a visit to The University of Kansas Medical Center and presented the RT program's potential at the Global Health Conference. The career path in Honduras is set to launch in 2026.

PRIMARY EDUCATION

Services Provided:



CAMO is deeply committed to transforming public education in rural Honduras, where resources are scarce, and opportunities are limited. By supporting 16 schools in these underserved areas, CAMO provides more than just textbooks and libraries—it's empowering teachers with training in new, innovative pedagogical methods that inspire real change in the classroom.

This year, during CAMO's international brigade, 48 dedicated teachers from these schools participated in an inspiring workshop led by Dr. Kristin Bourdage, a renowned education specialist, and Diana Ross, an experienced teacher. Through this training, educators gained cutting-edge teaching techniques and sharpened their skills, equipping them to make a lasting impact on their students' lives.

Beyond academic support, CAMO prioritizes the health and well-being of the children in these schools. Regular assessments ensure that any hearing, vision, dental, or nutritional issues are detected early and addressed promptly, ensuring that no child's education is hindered by preventable health challenges. CAMO's holistic approach to education not only opens doors to brighter futures but also nurtures healthier, more confident children ready to embrace the opportunities ahead.

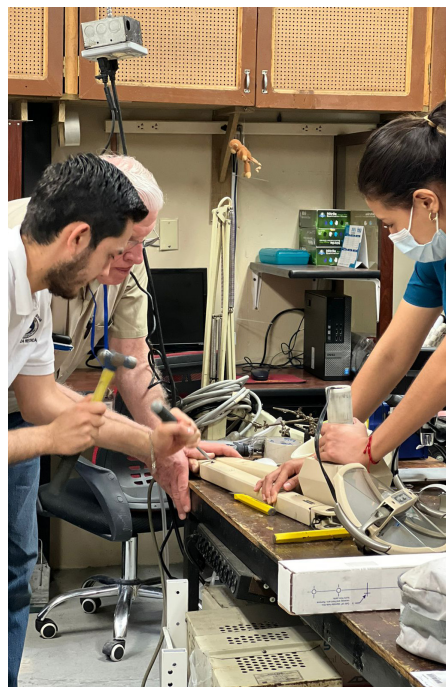

CAMO's unwavering dedication to uplifting vulnerable communities in Honduras has never been more evident than in its ongoing initiatives. From providing a safe haven at the Casa Hogar women's shelter to empowering the next generation through its Trade School and offering safe spaces for youth at the Community Gym, CAMO is transforming lives every day. This past fiscal year, CAMO has offered refuge and training to countless women and children affected by domestic violence, helping them rebuild their lives with dignity and hope. The Trade School has equipped students with vital technical skills, giving them the tools to break the cycle of poverty. Meanwhile, the Community Gym has become a hub of positive engagement, where youth can thrive through sports and mentorship, keeping them off the streets and fostering a brighter future. CAMO's impact extends to health care as well, with significant investments in the Hospital de Occidente leading to improved facilities and enhanced patient care. These achievements are made possible through the generosity of our donors, whose contributions fuel CAMO's mission of saving lives, delivering education, and strengthening the well-being of entire communities. Every life touched by CAMO's work is a testament to the power of collective action and compassion.



HEALTH CENTERS AND HOSPITALS



CAMO made a transformative investment of over \$45,370 to overhaul the Emergency Room at Hospital de Occidente, directly improving patient care and saving lives. This initiative upgraded infrastructure, provided essential medical equipment, and delivered critical staff training, resulting in faster and more efficient treatment for emergency cases.

Key improvements, including demolitions, new construction, and enhanced security systems, have streamlined patient flow and optimized triage for critical cases, ensuring timely and life-saving interventions. U.S. emergency physician Dr. Rosalia Mahr led vital training for doctors and nurses, focusing on teamwork, triage, and resuscitation, equipping the staff to handle high-pressure situations with greater efficiency. To further elevate care, the emergency room staff will continue training and earn Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) certification based on American Heart Association standards. CAMO's efforts are not just reshaping the hospital's infrastructure but also elevating the quality of care and strengthening the region's capacity to respond to medical emergencies.

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP

We continue to support the following organizations whose facilities we have built and retain a seat on each organizations' Board of Directors.

COMMUNITY GYM



With CAMO's support, the Community Gym has become a safe space for youth and the community. Each day, over 600 children and young people engage in free sports activities, including volleyball, basketball, chess, soccer, and table tennis, offering positive alternatives to violence and juvenile delinquency. Notable participation in table tennis, volleyball, and chess has led to competitors in national and international tournaments, including a World Chess Tournament in Hungary. This year, the initiative "Playing, We Learn Values" promoted physical health and community principles.

WOMEN'S SHELTER (CASA HOGAR)

CAMO remains committed to Casa Hogar Santa Rosa, a refuge for women and children affected by domestic violence. In the past year, 104 women and their children received shelter, counseling, and relocation support, with the shelter aiding 1,508 individuals since its opening. This year, workshops educated 2,000 women and girls on gender-based violence and their rights, while 11,820 participants took part in training sessions organized by Fundación Casa Hogar Santa Rosa, empowering local women and raising awareness of available services.

TRADE SCHOOL

For over two decades, CAMO has played a key role in the expansion and success of the Trade School, which benefited 1,419 students this year alone. By funding and managing critical infrastructure projects, CAMO has significantly improved the school's facilities, including the recent completion of a second floor of the second educational building, set to serve as a new Training Center for health care professionals. This achievement was made possible through the generous support of the Burton D.Morgan Foundation, the Noble Foundation, United Titanium, and numerous individual donors who have helped bring the Trade School's Expansion Project closer to full realization. The Trade School continues to grow its educational offerings, forging partnerships with municipalities, cooperatives, and both local and international organizations. CAMO's commitment to the school's mission is opening doors for students, equipping them with the skills and opportunities to build brighter futures for themselves and their communities.

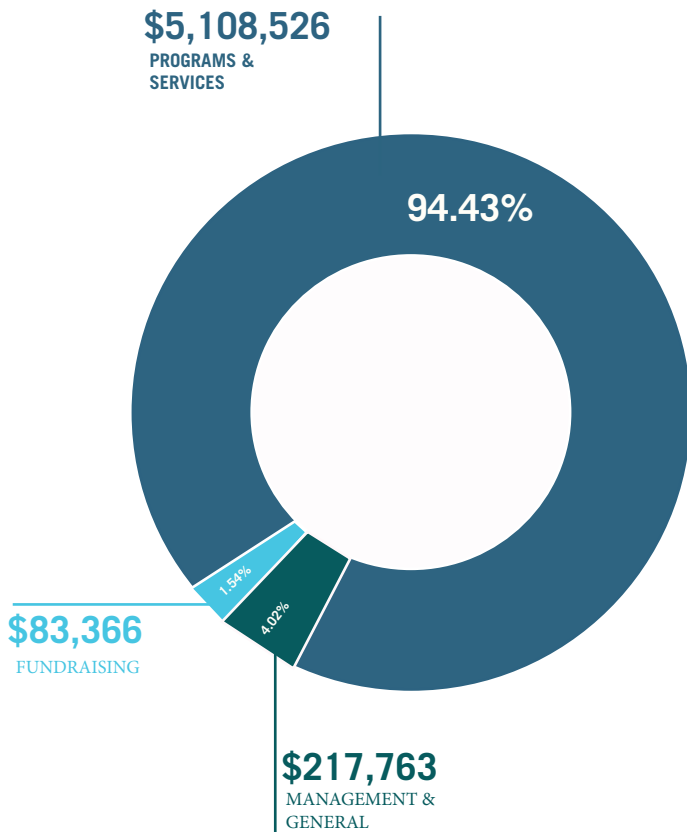

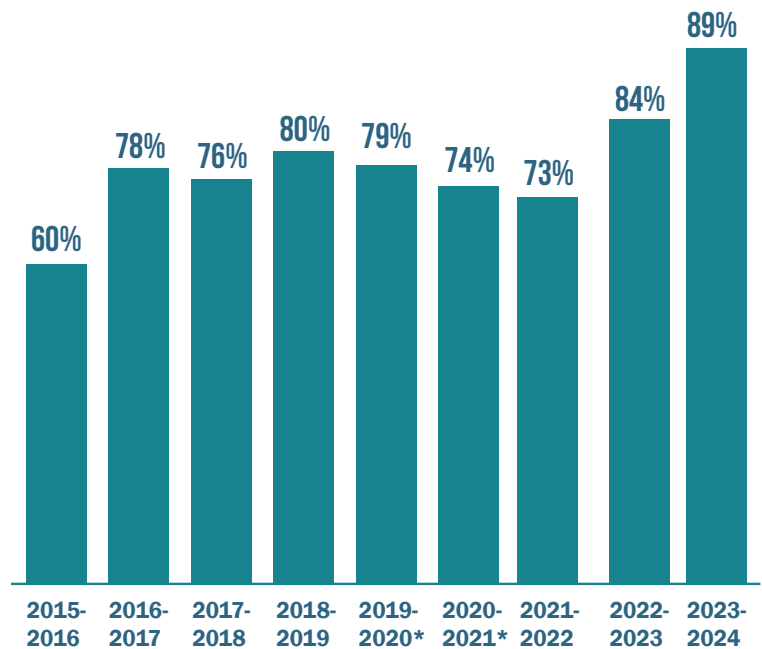
ANNUAL OPERATING EXPENSES
